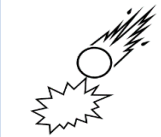



Learn to identify each type of cultural heritage and its characteristics.

Cultural Heritage

- Tangible cultural heritage:
 - ✓ movable cultural heritage (paintings, sculptures, coins, manuscripts)
 - ✓ immovable cultural heritage (monuments, archaeological sites, and so on)
 - ✓ underwater cultural heritage (shipwrecks, underwater ruins and cities)
- Intangible cultural heritage: oral traditions, performing arts, rituals
- Natural heritage: natural sites with cultural aspects such as cultural landscapes, physical, biological or geological formations
- Heritage in the event of armed conflict

<p>4. Oral Heritage City Oral and Intangible (rites, festivals and traditions inherited generationally)</p>	

<p>1. Geological City Geological processes or phenomena (Canyons, Glaciers, Cenotes).</p>	
<p>2. Geomorphic City Geomorphic elements or forms of the relief due to erosion processes, weathering due to gravity or water or due to the influence of climate.</p>	
<p>3. Ecosystem City Ecosystems and Communities: plants, animals.</p>	
<p>4. City of Nature Natural phenomena</p>	
<p>5. Preserving City Natural habitats to preserve.</p>
